Thoughts from Pastor Sarah



January has been a hard month for many of us with the flu and other ailments being passed from hand to hand. I pray that this newsletter finds you in better health or continued good health! Please be careful, and rest as you need to!

Several weeks ago, I decided on this reflection for the newsletter—and I ask that you bear with me and read it in its entirety. Hear me out, if you will. It's important.

Do you have your plans in place in the event of your death? (Who better to ask you than your pastor?) But seriously, do you? Regardless your age, and I mean that, do you have your family

or close friends instructed on where your paperwork is, and what to do if you die unexpectedly?

I ask this because I have sat at too many tables with family members in shocked grief who cannot answer basic questions because while there may have been a will, nothing was left *in writing* to help the family make decisions regarding *burials*, *services*, *favorite hymns*, *and memorials*. I have had family members make decisions that I know my beloved member would not have liked, but with nothing in writing, I cannot advocate for him/her. It is heart-breaking for pastors to sit with adult children we do not know and watch as they struggle.

About 5 years ago, Pete and I drew up our wills, our patient advocate forms and our "end of life" decisions. A few years later, this pastor realized—I did not even have for MY family what I would desire in the event of my death—where to find papers, what kind of service I would like, what my favorite hymns are... what a burden this would be on my own family, in their time of grief, to plan out my celebration of life.

And so, I ask you to join me. Write it down. Take an hour and write down your wishes for burial, where and what type of service you would like, your favorite hymns and Scripture, where you want any memorials to go to. Write it all down, make a copy and pass it on to the church and to your lawyer. I have a file here at St. John that will always be here, locked away, until needed. And when it is needed, the pastor will pull out your wishes and make sure that they are done. This is the best gift you can give your loved ones. So please, do it sometime during Lent, and pass it on to me at the church.

And did you know? With the new hospital privacy laws, no one calls the church anymore to let us know if you are in the hospital. Even if you tell the nurses at registration your church name and affiliation, we do not receive a call. You or your loved one must call the church. And often, I do not find out about hospitalizations until you are home. Even if you don't want "fuss," and I understand that, still let me know.

These are heavy thoughts for our newsletter, but very important ones. If you have any questions, please call me. And to help assist you, we do have a form that we created here at the church for those who would like to use that for funeral planning and memorials. Simply call the church office and I can email or mail it to you.

Blessings to you all this Lenten Season, I pray I see you often as we journey to the cross with our Savior.

A Report from our Treasurer

A Summary of 2017 Financial Results

On behalf of Pastor, Church Council and myself, I would like to thank all the members of St John for their generosity in 2017. Our members responded strongly to the 2017 Stewardship drive. Overall giving to the Current Fund was up 9.5% over the prior year. We have not seen that kind of increase in giving in years.

Current Fund

That strong response in giving allowed us to reduce our draw on the Endowment to meet our current expenses from \$67,000 in 2016 to \$60,000 in 2017. It is important to note this has reversed a long-term trend of increasing reliance on the Endowment to pay our current bills. With your continued support, it is everyone's hope that St. John will be able to reduce the draw on the endowment to pay current expenses to \$45,000 in 2018.

This year you will see St John's Current Income and Expenses reported quarterly to the congregation in a new format.

As you can see the three sources of church funding are clearly outlined with the percentage of total funding each source contributes. In 2018 we hope your generosity will continue and we can increase Congregational giving to 69% to 70% of the total. This year we added **1810 House Rent** and **Miscellaneous Room Rentals** to Third Party Income to increase revenue from rental income sector to 15% to 16% of total funds contributed. Last year we had to use those two sources of income to help fund several unexpected major building repairs. Finally in 2018 we hope to reduce the use of endowment funds to 15% to 16% of total funds needed.

Endowment

Our Endowment saw strong financial performance in 2017. We earned an 11% return on our investments, well above our average 6% to 8% return. This past year we were able to both meet our needs and still grow the Endowment. However, we had to use 70% of the investment income we generated in 2017 (in a great year for the market) to cover all of the endowment disbursements. In the longer term we need to reduce our use of annual investment income to the 50% range. This will allow us to increase the growth of the endowment so we have a better cushion for those years when the market is flat or down.

Capital Expenses

On the Expense side 2017 was a tough year for unexpected major capital expenses. We had a costly sewage blockage that required digging up and replacing a section of sewer pipe and the removal of a tree and roots that caused the problem. Several other trees were removed due to danger to people or property. It was necessary to block where bats were getting into the church attic and clean up a great deal of bat guano so we could safely service some of our HVAC systems. Hopefully that will be a one-time expense. We needed a roofing replacement for a section of the church/school building. We had major HVAC repairs done. We replaced four windows in the church office area that could not be repaired. Finally, in the fall we had to replace and re-grade a section of cracked sidewalk that was allowing rainwater to seep into the Fellowship hall. In total, we had to spend \$28,783 for Capital Expense projects in 2017. Fortunately, we were able to find enough additional sources of revenue that we were able to limit our draw on the endowment to \$11,500 for Capital Expenses.

Children and Youth News



From our Nursey School Director, Carrie Engel. The frigid weather has helped bring many lessons about snow and ice to life in our classrooms. Discussions and activities about snowflakes, snowmen, freezing and melting, winter animals and hibernation can be heard and seen throughout the halls. The Nursery School took part in the MLK Challenge through the Giving Tree. Families donated socks, granola bars and crackers. On January 19th, the PreK rolled the donated socks around a granola bar and a pack of crackers getting them

ready to give warmth and nutrition to those in need. Sock rolls will be handed out to homeless men in Norristown and Philadelphia. Valentine's Day is right around the corner, students are looking forward to celebrating their friends with card exchanges and a special treat! We have begun registration for the 2018-2019 school year. There is space available in each age group. Our students will complete their confirmation studies this year—we will affirm their baptisms on Pentecost Sunday. Please pray for these four students as they continue to grow in their faith and prepare to affirm the baptismal vows that their parents made many years go.
