Thoughts from Pastor Steve

Lent – a slice of the Church year, a slice of pie



Lent is to Easter as Advent is to Christmas. Lent and Advent had their origins as penitential, preparatory seasons. Advent has lost much of its penitential character, (in many churches it has even shed its penitential color, purple). Advent is never more than 4 weeks, Lent is always 6 ½ weeks.

When I think about Lent, much more so than Advent, I think of *doing something* – often, giving up something – sweets, coffee, 2nd helpings, etc. In recent years, there has been a focus on doing something by adding something – reading scripture, reserving more time for prayer, doing good deeds.

As a child, I would give up desserts for Lent. My Mom would reward me by taking me to get a banana split after Easter. It was definitely an incentive. I was not raised in a liturgical church, so I was intrigued when I learned from a Catholic friend that Sundays were not technically part of Lent. I remember fact-checking in our *Funk and Wagnall's Encyclopedia* and learning – he was right! However, my mother was old school, so if I wanted that split, I had to quit desserts on Sundays in Lent as well.

This is a long introduction for me to get to the point: it is hard to do anything out of the ordinary and keep doing it for 6 ½ weeks in Lent. I know from Advent how difficult it is just to maintain the discipline of having an evening wreath-lighting devotion for the 25 or so days of Advent.

Lent is coming. My usual question – what shall I do? This year, I pose another question: what is, exactly, the point of having a so-called Lenten discipline? Will it get me closer to Jesus? Does my 'sacrifice' help me better connect to Jesus' sacrifice? Does it make my celebration of Easter more meaningful? Do Sundays count? And, finally, does Jesus care if I have a piece of apple pie on February 27th? Of all the questions to ask when it comes to Lent, maybe the apple pie question is the important one – because it is one I can answer: Jesus <u>does not</u> care about my slice of apple pie. PERIOD. So, if I eat it or not – I am on my own.

Maybe this is a good place to start thinking about Lent – with freedom – the freedom to eat a slice of pie or not. But to also remember that I do not live out my freedom on my own. When there are three people at our table and only two slices of pie left, I can choose not to have a slice. And, even if I am trying to give up sweets in Lent, when I visit a parishioner who offers me a slice of homemade pie, I can choose to eat it.

Maybe a good place to start thinking about Lent is to remember that Lent is not just about me. It is a season of the church – the home of my fellow sisters and brothers in Christ. Maybe a good thing for me in Lent is to be with the people of God in worship, in fellowship, in prayer.

Lent is a season that directs us all to see Jesus completing his earthly ministry – going to the Cross. Maybe a good thing for me in Lent is to focus on Jesus – in the Sunday lessons, in the mid-week devotions, in my prayers, in my Scripture time.

Maybe there is a place for discipline – during Lent, during Advent, during each day of my life. Maybe there is a place for thinking about what I am doing and what I am not doing. Maybe there is a place for thinking about others who are affected by what I am doing and what I am not doing.

There is still time for me to think of something that will make my Lenten days different. As I ponder this, I do know that there is a place for repenting – turning to God, turning away from words and deeds, from thoughts and inactions that do not honor God. Yes, Lent is a season for turning to the Cross of Jesus. This Cross will be marked on my forehead on Ash Wednesday with the ashes of last year's palms and I will be reminded that there is a connection from season to season from Lent to Lent. And I will remember: Lent does not depend on my doing or thinking, my giving up or taking on. As Lent begins, I will also hear the words, "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return."

I will remember that I am playing, I am living, with house money. It is called grace. Grace. It is freedom – God's radical freeing in Jesus that frees me to observe Lent, to observe, again, the workings of our gracious God in Jesus. This is important to remember. May I just remember to say grace if and when I eat that slice of pie. Thank you, Jesus. Amen.
