# Thoughts from Pastor Steve

#### Advent ... Waiting



Advent is upon us. The First Sunday in Advent is December 1. Advent is the season of waiting - waiting with hopeful expectation. This Church season invites us to step out of the days of Christmas-is-already-here back to those days when the coming of the Christ was a promise. Granted, it is a bit artificial, like many of the Christmas trees nowadays. We know that the promise of Christ's coming has been fulfilled; we know that the angels have already sung the first Christmas carol: "Christ the Savior is born!" Yet, it can be good for us to wait and to take time in our waiting to ponder the Promise, to ponder its fulfillment and to ponder what it means, what it has meant,

what it could mean for our lives. So, we will gather on December Sundays and 'pretend' that Christmas has not yet come. We will take time to breathe in the words of the prophets witnessing to the Promise; we will sing the Advent hymns that echo their witness. We will wait for Christmas, together.

Since the first Sunday in May, St. John has been in a period of waiting. Waiting for the process that will lead to the calling of a new pastor. Waiting for the next steps. Waiting for the future. Not exactly knowing what is coming. Waiting.

My observation is that the waiting at St. John that began back in the spring was not Advent waiting. Advent waiting is hopeful, expectant waiting. This was not the case at first - there were too many other emotions and thoughts in the way of hopefulness. But that changed. I was here and, yet, I am not exactly sure when it became Advent waiting at St. John. Maybe it began with the first 250th Anniversary event - the special service with inspiring words from Bishop Pat Davenport, the full church, the fellowship meal - even the posing for the anniversary picture. Maybe it began as we came back week after week for Sunday worship this summer-Word and Sacrament, praise and prayer - together. Maybe the hope came when we completed a full-week VBS with lots of kids and teachers and fun. By fall, we were ready for 'normal' - our regular worship schedule, our regular schedule of meetings, our regular guests - Boy Scouts, yoga classes, art classes, nursery schoolers. In the fall, our hopefulness was affirmed with a great day for the Annual Car Show, with an enthusiastic turn-out for the Reenactment Day, with the full, full house for the Mozart *Requiem*, our 250th Anniversary Concert.

In plenty of time for Advent, St. John has entered into the hopeful expectation mode as the transition process unfolds, as we prepare to install and launch our Call Committee. You might say that St. John is not celebrating Christmas early, but that we have celebrated Advent - hopeful expectation - early!

One further observation about the hopefulness change at St. John is that it is connected to St. John's leadership. I am impressed with the staff - Larry, as the veteran, has brought much insight and knowledge to the behind the scenes support that can easily go unnoticed. We do notice the wonderful music he brings to worship

(and special occasions!). Marcie, our accountant, continues to be a stable force answering many questions, keeping us on financially sound basis. We have two new staff members - Sue and Vince - both began in January and are cycling through the worship-parish life of St. John for the first time. They are committed to doings things right and well and are humble in their learning curve. Carrie does a wonderful job with our Nursery School and is more than open to finding ways to connect her families with St. John. Church Council has stepped up - from the first extra meeting to digest the announcement of pastoral change to the meetings to help launch St. John in the transition process. Pastor Bell, an 'old' friend, has given a gentle, guiding hand to the Council, to the Transition Committee and to the congregation. She will soon be doing the same for the St. John Call Committee. Church Council is supported by the active committees of St. John that provide the gifts of planning and brainstorming, following-through and communicating. Our leadership is leading and inspiring all of us to make the 250<sup>th</sup> year at St. John another very, memorable year, even as we wait.

Yes, at St. John we are waiting. Advent is coming. Christmas is coming. A new pastor is coming. We are waiting. We are blessed to be able to wait with hopeful expectation - together.

# Advocacy News

In the fall, our Advocacy Team identified a variety of topics on which to focus our efforts for the coming year. Our goal is to bring to the attention of the congregation the social statements and Advocacy work of the ELCA. We have designated one issue to be addressed each month in our Sunday bulletins, with short informational articles from the ELCA and specific ways members can advocate for change, help others and be "God's Work, Our Hands" in the world. Each Sunday, there is also a prayer petition focused on the social issue.

In October, our focus was Climate Change and Environmental Issues. November emphasized Military Veterans, including ways to remember, reach out and help veterans, many of whom carry with them ongoing physical, social and emotional injuries.

Our emphasis for December, is Peacemaking. The mural, The Peace Wall, by is one of the murals in the Greys Ferry section of Philadelphia. When the Director of The Mural Arts Program of Philadelphia, Jane Golden, brought the idea of creating a community mural to this racially divided neighborhood, which was plagued by violence in 1997, community organizers were skeptical. Residents, black and white, worked with the artists on the composition of the mural and then began tackling other issues to clean up their neighborhood. The Peace Wall includes the Bible verse from Matthew 5:9, "Blessed are the Peacemakers, for they shall be called the children of God." Director Golden says, "Community public art can knit people together in a way that other things can't. It has this ability to build a consensus and to challenge people who think collectively for the greater good."

Each month, we highlight a Mural Arts mural related to our emphasis. Thank you to Carol Weidler for suggesting these for us. In the spring, we will have the opportunity to join Carol for a tour of various murals in the city related to our Advocacy issues.
